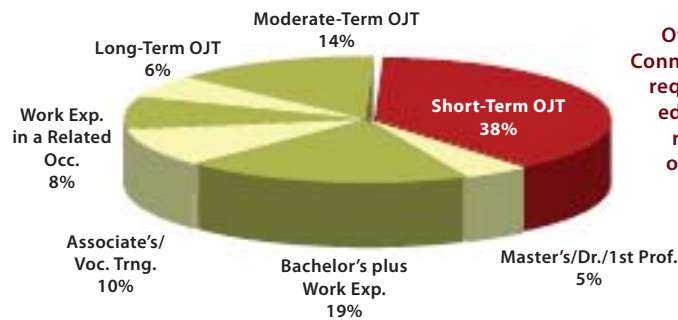

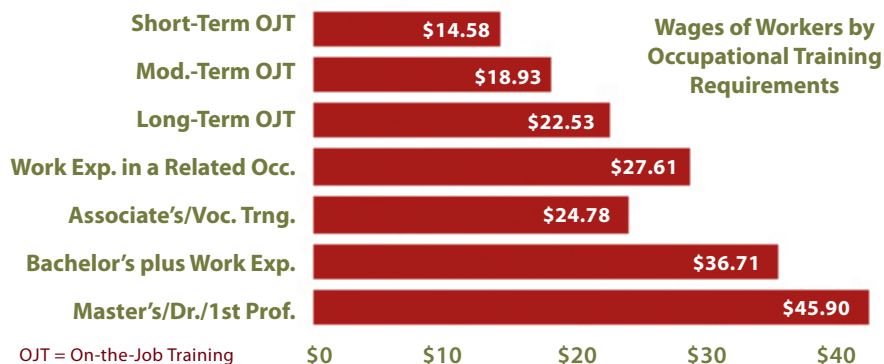
Over a third (34%) of Connecticut's job openings require post-secondary education, while 38% require short-term on-the-job training.
